WHAT IS BLEEDING (HEMORRHAGE)?

An escape of blood from a ruptured blood vessel.

Bleeding, or hemorrhage, is the name used to describe blood loss. It can refer to blood loss inside the body, called internal bleeding. Or it can refer to blood loss outside of the body, called external bleeding.

TYPES OF HEMORRHAGE

There are three different types of hemorrhage in the same patient: subdural hematoma, intraparenchymal hemorrhage (from contusion), and subarachnoid blood.

CAUSES OF HEMORRHAGE

- Head trauma or injuries.
- Cerebral aneurysm, a weak area in an artery in the brain.
- High blood pressure.
- Blood vessel abnormalities.
- Blood or bleeding disorders.
- Liver disease.
- Brain tumor.
- Drug abuse.

SYMPTOMS OF HEMORRHAGE

- A sudden severe headache.
- Seizures with no previous history of seizures.
- Weakness in an arm or leg.
- Nausea or vomiting.
- Decreased alertness; lethargy.
- Changes in vision.
- Tingling or numbness.
- Difficulty speaking or understanding speech.
