

WHAT IS STOMATITIS (ULCERS IN THE MOUTH)



Stomatitis is a sore or inflammation inside of the mouth. The sore can be in the cheeks, gums, inside of the lips, or on the tongue. The two main forms of stomatitis are herpes stomatitis, also known as a cold sore, and aphthous stomatitis, also known as a canker sore.

TYPES OF STOMATITIS

Types of stomatitis include: Canker sore: A canker sore, also known as an aphthous ulcer, is a single pale or yellow ulcer with a red outer ring or a cluster of such ulcers in the mouth, usually on the cheeks, tongue, or inside the lip.

SYMPTOMS OF STOMATITIS

- Mouth ulcers with a white or yellow layer and red base, usually inside the lips, cheek, or on the tongue.
- Red patches.
- Blisters.
- Swelling.
- Oral dysesthesia - a burning feeling in the mouth.
- Lesions that heal in 4-14 days and often recur.

CAUSE OF STOMATITIS

Aphthous stomatitis is not caused by a virus and is not contagious. Instead, it's caused by problems with oral hygiene or damage to mucous membranes. Some causes include: dry tissues from breathing through the mouth due to clogged nasal passages.
