STONES IN URINARY TRACT

Urinary tract stones begin to form in a kidney and may enlarge in a ureter or the bladder. Depending on where a stone is located, it may be called a kidney stone, ureteral stone, or bladder stone. The process of stone formation is called urolithiasis, renal lithiasis, or nephrolithiasis.

CAUSES OF STONES IN URINARY TRACT

Bladder stones usually develop when your bladder doesn't empty completely, and the urine forms crystals. The most common conditions that cause bladder stones include: Prostate gland enlargement. An enlarged prostate (benign prostatic hyperplasia) can cause bladder stones in men.

SYMPTOMS OF STONES IN URINARY TRACT

- Lower abdominal pain.
- In men, pain or discomfort in the penis or testicles.
- A burning sensation during urination.
- Frequent urination.
- Difficulty urinating or interrupted urine flow.
- Blood in the urine.
